- (4) <u>Campus Career Zone</u>: Regularly check your campus's career zone website for updates on parttime job opportunities, particularly for summer positions.
- (5) <u>Job Fairs:</u> Regularly check your campus's career zone or online for upcoming job fairs. Always carry an updated resume to these events, as they often offer immediate interview opportunities, allowing you to directly impress potential employers.
- **(5)** <u>Contact Professors for TA Positions:</u> If aiming to be a Teaching Assistant, ensure you excel in the relevant class and make a good impression throughout the semester. Then email your professors directly express your desire to become a TA.
- (6) Network for Recommendations: Engage with your connections for potential job leads.

3. Balance Work and Studies:

- (1) <u>Balance Work and Studies</u>: Plan a work schedule that supports your academics. Seek insights from past students in your program about course demands to inform your work commitments.
- **(2)** Allow Flexibility: Keep your schedule flexible for personal growth, skill development, and networking opportunities.

4. Understand Your Rights as a Part-Time Worker:

- (1) Minimum Wage: Check the latest minimum wage in Ontario (currently \$16.55/hour).
- **(2)** <u>Termination Pay</u>: Part-time workers qualify for termination pay after three months of employment, provided there's no misconduct involved.

5. Adhere to Work Hour Limits:

The policy allowing international students to work more than 20 hours weekly ends on December 31, 2023. Adhering to this rule is essential to ensure eligibility for future work permits and permanent residency applications.
